The urge to touch hands that have long since been lost; to collapse time and space, connecting an unfathomably ancient impulse and a new dawn. 


Hampstead Heath, 25 September 2019, 14:42 (2024–25) Pigmented alkyd on aluminium $48\times64~\mathrm{cm}$









Following spread *Upshot-Knothole Annie I (17 March, 1953)* (2024) Pigmented alkyd on aluminium 192 × 120 cm




